# Provide a brief summary of the proposed program changes and describe the rationale for the change(s):

We are deleting two required courses (Western Civilization I & II) and replacing them with two other courses (Civic Engagement and History for Teachers). The reason for this change is that most public schools no longer require Western Civilization as a graduation requirement. Instead, we are replacing those two courses with a course that will introduce history education students to the skills necessary to conceptualize content as units (History for Teachers) and a course that will explore the history of civic engagement, a concept that is at the core of the social studies. In addition, we are also officially designating EDUC400 as our capstone course (this course has already been submitted as a capstone course by the School of Education).

Both of these courses are grounded in the content of history, which supports our program objective of preparing teacher candidates in a sophisticated understanding of their content area. The courses will help students begin to think pedagogically about the big ideas and skills of the social studies. Because students will most likely take these courses as sophomores and juniors, it will help facilitate a community of history education students before their senior practicum courses, which are currently the only courses that they are required to take together.

- 1. The new courses require students to critically read and analyze primary and secondary sources, to use a thematic approach in conceptualizing units of study, and to connect readings and discussions to the teaching of the social studies to secondary students.
- 2. The new courses will require both small and large expository writing in the form of essays, reflection journals, and unit block outs.
- 3. The new courses will require cooperative group work and projects as well as independent work. Both courses will emphasize the need to teach for social justice as well as preparing teacher candidates for cultural competency in the classroom.
- 4. The new courses examine a variety of issues related to multicultural education, teaching diverse students, creating safe and welcoming classroom environments, and preparing students for civic competence.
- 5. The new courses will use a variety of sources from the social studies, including economics, geography, political science, psychology, anthropology and sociology. They will also incorporate educational research studies.
